# **BACKGROUND**

In September 1975, fifteen good Samaritans of the Malayalee community met and discussed ways and means of uplifting the general economic status of the community in Malaysia in the long term. They agreed that one of the most tangible ways would be to upgrade the educational level of our young people at universities and colleges and that a fund be created to provide interest free loans. This proposal was tabled and discussed by the Delegates Conference of the All Malaysia Malayalee Association (AMMA) in October 1975 where it was unanimously accepted. Much hard work, discussion and study followed in order to identify the optimum method to raise and operate such a fund.

# **MISSION**

AMMA Foundation's mission is to provide disadvantaged students with a range of programmes and resources that include interest free loans, scholarships, grants, community outreach as well as networking opportunities to young graduates and assist them to become self-sufficient individuals and future leaders. Education is a basic human right and the Foundation is committed to play its part in helping needy Malaysians in this area.

- To provide loans and scholarships to deserving students to enable them to pursue tertiary education
- To solicit financial grants from the government, public and private sources to finance students' tertiary education.
- To develop and strengthen community resources, relationships and partnerships in support of the funding and networking programmes to assist students become self-sufficient individuals.

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings from my first term as President of AMMA Foundation (AF), which started 33 years ago from a humble base and has now given out more than RM3 million in study loans to more than 200 students.

While the main focus of the Foundation is to continue providing interest free loans to the financially challenged children, we also recognize excellent students who have performed well in the SPM examinations so that it serves as a motivation to pursue their higher degrees. We all know that Education is the basis for the upliftment of society. At AMMA Foundation, we are attempting to look at the entire value chain of Education and explore the avenues where help can be rendered - from providing loans to free tuition. Young professionals are motivated to excel in this competitive world by AF providing leadership talks to networking with industry programmes.

The calendar year of 2013, AMMA Foundation organized a number of events and fund raising activities not only to meet its financial obligations but also to meet the expected increase in demand for financial assistance. The first of such activities was the Donors' Appreciation Nite at The Gastro Project PJ on 20 March 2013 which was followed closely by a Fund Raising Nite at Shah Alam on 23 May 2013. We received overwhelming support from our past donors and wish to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of them.

We awarded 45 students for their SPM results on 30 June 2013 which was graced by our Deputy Education Minister II YB P Kamalanathan and attended by more than 150 students, parents and well wishers. Our excellence awards is now in its 11th year running. Our Board is following up with the Ministry to see how they can help us in our plight and also our Foundation can assist in the implementation of the National Education Blueprint which was launched on 6 September 2013.

AMMA Foundation is now on Facebook so do Like our page to get an insight of our activities todate. We also have a Youtube channel with several short video animations to explain what we do better to those more tech savy individuals. As communication is a vital part of our Foundation, to get more members and donors and as an avenue to reach out to students and youth, we are implementing a mini CRM email tool in 2014.

Our Board of Directors are in dialogue with some organisations to support students with a full or partial Scholarships. Hopefully, our discussions will result in fruitful outcomes as this will be the first time we have such scholarships or grants, opposed to study loans. We expect some positive news on this in 2014.

We also restarted some of our activities on youth leadership in 2013. We had our Future Debate Series which brought together 4 teams and on 19 October 2013 we held a debate on Social Networking which was well attended. AMMA Foundation's challenge trophy was created and we intend to have our debate sessions frequently to garner interest from youth to improve on public speaking. In conjunction with this event, we held our Meet the CEOs sessions where we had Dr Rodwin Bahadur speaking on entrepreneurship. The importance of youth and young professionals to networking with successful entreprenuers was the objective and we intend to use this platform to explore our ambitions here.

The Foundation during the year also appointed 4 new directors, namely Mr. Gopinath Pillai, Mr. Ashwin Kumar Das, Mr. Dinesh Rajenthiran and Mrs. Sujatha Sekhar Naik. 3 Directors resigned, namely Mr. Baskaran Nair, En. Ahmad Hassan and Dr. Neville Fernandez. Our aim is to bring in directors who are able to challenge the decisions of the Board and propel the Foundation to greater heights as we enter into some new forays of fund raising and community building. We have also set KPIs for the Board to ensure that we are on target for our planned activities, as we want to operate efficiently and use the time we spend towards making greater impact. Our Board also disposed off all unit trust investments to plan for a more liquid asset position during the year.

Our Board is also is constant touch with the All Malaysia Malayalee Association, our founding organization. We have attended several events jointly and organized by the various affiliates and samajams. We thank them for their support. On 21 September 2013, we also had a small Onam luncheon at the Foundation office where we served 50 students from the Right to Learn project.

AF is currently reaching out to all Malaysians, irrespective of race, creed and religion. The Foundation is in league with other educational foundations and works hand in glove with their goals. With more students graduating annually, AF hopes to increase its membership and extend more outreach programmes to the needy.

We have also realized our dream of providing an avenue for free tuition to underprivileged children and a place for school dropouts to obtain assistance when the home environment is not conducive for learning and duly set up the "Right to Learn" Project. The Right to Learn needs an annual funding of RM100,000 and we intend to open 3 more centres requiring additional funds. The results of more than 125 students under this programme is now being documented and we have seen great impact on the students and looking into the programme being more effective.



# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As much as the Foundation would like to reach all needy and deserving students, its financial limitation necessarily dictates that it has to reject many deserving applicants. Our loans take a 12 year period to get repaid. Therefore, we need constant funding. Annually, we require RM 750,000 and in the last 12 months we have handed out more than RM 700,000 loans to 70 students. However, as we reflect on these proud achievements, we also need to focus on how we are going to continue and sustain this good work of the AMMA Foundation. AF is currently relying on donations from well wishers and memberships. Our fund base allows us to continue our trends for student loan disbursements possibly for another one to two years unless we embark on some mega fund raising activities. Our Board of Directors are brainstorming on a few big events to fund raise and we welcome any participation from our members.

Our ultimate plan is to build an income generating Centre, with a sustainable revenues stream to fund our educational programmes. This also explains the RM4,000,000 grant received on 24 March 2013 from the Federal Government which is for the Malayalee Community Centre land purchase where AMMA Foundation is a joint beneficiary with the All Malaysia Malayalee Association. This project will be expected to be implemented by 2015 and we should see some sustainable results in about 5-7 years whereafter we hope to have a model that does not need constant funding drives which tires out our donors. Our Directors are also part of the Working Committee on this monumental project which we have embarked on.


# STUDENT EDUCATION LOANS

The AMMA Foundation has been active in assisting students in need of funds to complete their higher studies by providing them with a study loan. Currently each approved candidate is given a loan not exceeding RM 4,500 per semester per year, for degree courses and RM 3,500 per semester per year for diploma courses. The aid, given in the form of interest – free loan is subject to a bond by which the student undertakes to repay the loan in monthly installments on gaining employment after graduation.


The Foundation has granted loans to needy students in various parts of Malaysia and has also embarked on establishing tie-ups with private educational institutions locally to further assist the students. To date, most recipients of the loans are continuing their tertiary studies in various universities and colleges, both local and foreign

An Executive Committee headed by Prof. Aruna Gopinath administers the Study Loan Programme by AMMA Foundation. Another Director, Mr. Pramugh Pathmanaban also sits on the Committee. The committee met on 11 August 2012 and again on 23 February 2013 to consider and approve applications for study loans.

# Total Loans Disbursed (RM) (2007 - 2013)




# Loans Disbursed (Jun 2007 - Jun 2013)




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
# Student Education Preference Analysis (2008 - 2013)

# STUDENT EDUCATION LOANS


An annual analysis of the loans disbursed, show that the majority of the students still had their education preference for Medicine//Dental courses, 65% in 2013 and 70% in 2012. However the average number of students who prefer studying Medicine / Dental over the past is over 60%.



The number of female applicants and awardees in 2013 have shown a slight decrease in trend in comparison to male applicants and awardees.




# Recovery Status: No. of Students






# Loan Repayments Number of Students (Jun 2007 - Jun 2013)

At the end of the financial year 2013, AF has outstanding loans amounting to RM 2,965,198 from 215 students. With a 0 interest loan facility, in most cases recovering monthly installments on time is a challenge by itself. Over the last 5 years the recovery percentage has been seen to be improving. The last financial year witnessed AF recover about 16 % of its amount due. This marked a rise of 5 % from 2012. Continuous efforts are being made to collect the recoverable amount by the Directors who handle the Recovery Committee.

From the RM 2.9 Million that is due, it can be seen that about 46% of the students receiving aid are still pursuing their studies. 26% of the students are seen to be actively paying on time. 8% of the students have just completed their education and are about to initiate the repayment scheme. 20% of which are to be reviewed upon.




# **EXCELLENCE AWARDS**






# **FUTURE DEBATE SERIES**

# **MEET THE CEOS SESSION**

Dr. Rodwin joined Nokia OY, a then fledgling Telecom Company in Finland, and helped turn it to become a defining force in the emerging mobile telecom industry; in hindsight, this became the catalyst for a lifelong journey of exposure. In 2005, after 25+ years of "corporate practices"; having worked for three established and successful global technology companies; Nortel Ltd, Nokia OY and Ericsson AB, Dr. Rodwin left the corporate world to pursue entrepreneurial interests. The experiences gained during this period have developed the skills, knowledge and perspectives that have help shape his entrepreneurial practices today.

His philanthropic responsibilities include working with orphans and children with mental disabilities. Over the years, he has focused on developing life opportunities for young adults through projects that enable them to be the benefactors of tomorrow.





# **AMMA LEARNING CENTRE: RIGHT TO LEARN**

The Right-to-Learn project was founded in 2007 and works with AMMA foundation to give every child an opportunity to better themselves by staying in school. Our students are from lower income groups and orphanages within Kuala Lumpur. Ms. Yans Ganghadaran established the tuition centre at the Sri Mariaman temple in Taman Tun on 25th February 2007. It was set up for the underprivileged students in the Taman Tun community, mainly Indian students from the long house. Its focus was to provide consistent learning support and a learning environment for underprivileged children who are struggling in school with reading, writing in English and Maths. The Centre has since been adopted by AMMA Foundation and is operating in its new premises called AMMA Learning Centre as a funded project.

### Purpose of Project:

- To sponsor an existing Education Support Programme that benefits the underprivileged.
- To provide the space and financial support to sustain the programme.
- To follow up in a "start-to-finish" engagement through students' tertiary or vocational support.
- To fund an outreach programme that impacts the community.
- To establish similar learning centres as branches in other socially challenged neighbourhood to target the needy.

Children from challenged backgrounds are known to have difficulties in schoolwork and often lose interest when they do not understand lessons taught in school. We believe that all children have a potential and with the right approach and time, even the neglected ones will prove to be outstanding students. Lessons are conducted in a children-friendly environment at the Amma Learning Centre. Volunteers range from trained teachers, university students and homemakers who want to give back to play an active role in society.

Our dedicated and committed volunteers guide and assist the students in their problem areas. Students from these circumstances are often below the level they are slotted into at school. There are currently 45 students, ranging between 6 and 17 years old. There are 17 volunteer tutors. Each tutor works with small groups of students of the same academic level. Each volunteer handles about 5 hours a week. The centre is open from Mondays to Saturdays. No fees are charged.

# Our Objectives:

- To ensure literacy in all the children who come to us
- To ensure the proficiency of English and Bahasa Malaysia
- To bridge the gap between their real level and school level
- To give assistance wherever their academic difficulties are at the students pace
- To work with small groups in order to give maximum attention to the students

The teachers who volunteer their services are retired teachers, gap-year students, working women and housewives. Each tutor works with small groups of students of the same academic level. Each volunteer teaches for about 4 hours a week. The volunteers have formed a bank of active and inactive teachers. There are currently 17 active volunteers and several on-call volunteers who step in to replace last minute volunteer absentee. The most regular volunteers have worked without breaking their commitment since the project's relocation to the AMMA Learning Centre (ALC) in November 2011.



# AMMA LEARNING CENTRE: RIGHT TO LEARN

### Rumah Panjang – Taman Tun Dr. Ismail, Kuala Lumpur

The students from this area have benefitted the most from the project since its beginning in 2007. The first batch of UPSR students who sat for their examinations in 2012 delivered good grades. They are :-

- Megala 3A;2B
- Grace 5A
- Murali 4B;1C

## Rumah Hope – Paramount Garden, Petaling Jaya, Selangor

Rumah Hope is an orphanage in Petaling Jaya. Ms. Yans proposed 10 places to the Home which they accepted enthusiastically. Since then Rumah Hope requested the admission of 5 more students who have been admitted into the project. These students need this project because:

- they cannot afford any paid tuition.
- all the students were below their expected academic level.
- a few could only be registered in schools late as they did not have birth certificates and were not up to the school's academic level.
- a few do not read or write despite being in the Upper Primary levels.
- many have shown exceptional ability but need proper direction.

Despite their inclusion into the programme only recently, much progress has been made with the Rumah Hope children as they are showing their potential to learn with much eagerness. The following cases were observed:-

- Ragini (Form 1) a young girl with troubled family issues now comes regularly for classes and is showing much progress in her school work
- Ramesh (Std 5) has learned to read and is now doing mathematics that is of his level.
- Tamil (Std 6) a young boy has progressed in maths and improved in reading

The Right to Learn has also taken on Pusat Jagaan Kanak2 Sayang in Kampung Tunku, Selangor and Agathians Shelter, located in Section 8, Petaling Jaya, Selangor.

### Agathian Shelter – Section 8, Petaling Jaya, Selangor

An orphanage that provides a home to orphans, abandoned children and children of single parents. There is currently more than 35 children, ages ranging from 3 years to 18 years old, living in the orphanage. The RTL is has been hosting 22 children, of ages between 6 – 16 years old since 17 August 2013. They have been included in a programme of reading and mathematics. Secondary boys are being taught by volunteers recruited from CIMB for weekend programme.



### RIGHT-TO-LEARN IMPACT IN THE COMMUNITY

The examples given above are only a few of our success stories but the entirety of our student body has benefitted both academically and psychologically. The fact that they have committed and dedicated teachers who care about their wellbeing has manifested positively in their self-confidence, discipline and behaviour. The regularity in classes and consistent checks on their schoolwork have given their caregivers hope in their future.

### RIGHT-TO-LEARN PROGRESS ASSESSMENT

When students register with our project, a survey is conducted on their backgrounds and class performances and exam results to gauge the progress made in their studies.

Based on their previous and current results we record the areas of improvement and stagnation. Further tests are given to them in the core subjects within the centre, to assess their progress in their weak areas.

The volunteers also write reports on topics taught and the students' progress in the work that have already been accomplished.

The RTL was recently included in the "hati.org.my" website, a non profit web portal on Malaysian charities, non profit and non governmental organisations and under privileged communities. We are hopeful of tapping this portal for new volunteers to meet the expected increase in students who are less fortunate. You can also "meet" us at "ourbetterworld.org", an initiative of the Singapore International Foundation.

The RTL is associated with StART Society, a non-profit arts academy that provides FREE Art, Music, Dance, and Drama classes to more than 200 underprivileged children from various shelters/homes in the Klang Valley.

Looking ahead to 2014, we intend to approach skill-based academies or institutions, involved in culinary arts, automobile, hair-dressing schools, computer and secretarial schools, for sponsorships and placements/ internship programmes for our non-academic students. This would see us carry out a "start-to-finish" engagement with the RTL students as they become young adults and to steer the non-academic students to skill-based jobs that would be more suited to them.



### AMMA Learning Centre Project


# MALAYALEE COMMUNITY CENTRE UPDATE

On the Malayalee Community Centre (MCC) project, we would like to update you that we have received the first tranche of the Grant, comprising RM 4 million, from the Ministry of Finance. The remaining RM 4 million is expected to be paid by the Government to AMMA Foundation on or about April 2014. The MCC constitutes a joint initiative between AMMA and AMMA Foundation and will be incorporated and operational in the future based on terms as approved by the Government for the disbursement of the Grant and that as agreed between AMMA and AMMA Foundation. The Board of Directors, AMMA Foundation, collectively agreed to place these monies in a separate trust account held in our bank for the purpose of the MCC project.

Two Working Committee meetings have been held, the most recent one being on 7 August 2013: In general, there is a major consensus towards the MCC and support has even come in the form of an offer to help raise funds. We hope that the Community Centre project that is being planned by the All Malaysia Malayalee Association and AF, will take shape in the near future and provide a recurring income to AF. However, the project will require time and would probably take at least another 5 years to materialize.

- Cultural: A centre for the development of language, dance and art forms
- Social: A multi-purpose hall to cater for weddings, gatherings, leisure activities, conferences, workshops, community services.
- Educational: A learning centre complete with library, archives and study hall
- Resource Centre: For the implementation of Youth & Women development programmes and networking events
- Hostel: To provide temporary accommodation for dire emergency needs
- F&B Outlets: To serve fine Kerala Cusine to be enjoyed by all Malaysians
- Revenue Source: To generate recurrent income through leasing office space, to be financially independent
- Civic: An institution for carrying out our civic responsibilities owed to society and further cementing a mutual understanding among the multi-ethnic groups in our nation




# Total Assets RM (2008 - 2013)

Over 34% of AF's assets lie in its Disbursed Study Loans among students. About 64% is in Fixed Deposits and a mere 1% as cash and bank balance.


# **Total Assets Breakdown (2008 - 2013)**






# Total Income/Expenditure Rollout (2008 - 2013)

The operating expenses of AF is primarily its Management Costs, AMMA Learning Centre and Office Rentals.





### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 30TH JUNE 2013

### 1.GENERAL

The financial statements of the Foundation are expressed in Malaysian Ringgit (RM).

The Foundation was incorporated in Malaysia as a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. It is resident in Malaysia with its registered office at Suite 1007, 10th Floor, Wisma Lim Foo Yong, No. 86, Jalan Raja Chulan, 50200 Kuala Lumpur and principal place of business at 40-B, Lorong Rahim Kajai 14, Taman Tun Dr. Ismail, 60000 Kuala Lumpur.

### 2.PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Foundation are to receive and administer funds for charitable and educational purposes. There have been no significant changes in the nature of these activities during the financial year.

### 3.BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Accounting Standards Board's ("MASB") Private Entity Reporting Standards and the provisions of the Companies Act, 1965.

### **4.AUTHORISATION FOR ISSUE OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements of the Foundation have been approved by the Board of Directors for issuance on 06 November 2013

### **5.ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

(b) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.



(Incorporated in Malaysia)

The carrying amounts of fixed assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such an indication exists, the assets's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an item of fixed assets exceeds its recoverable amount. The impairment loss is charged to the income and expenditure statement unless it reverses a previous revaluation in which case it will be charged to equity. Any subsequent increase in recoverable amount is reduced by the amount that would have been recognised as depreciation had the write down or write off not occurred. Such subsequent increase in recoverable amount is recognised in the income statement unless it reverses an impairment loss on a revalued asset, in which case it is taken to equity.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets on a straight line basis over the expected useful lives of the assets concerned. The principal annual rates used are as follows:-

Gain or losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amounts and are included in operating income.

### (c) Taxation and Deferred Taxation

Provision for taxation is made based on the amount of tax estimated to be payable on profits adjusted for tax purposes and is measured using the tax rates that have been enacted at the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is provided by the balance sheet liability method based on all taxable temporary differences by comparing carrying amounts of assets and liabilities and their corresponding tax bases.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credit can be utilised. Deferred tax is not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction which is not a business combination and at the time of the transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is recognised in the income and expenditure statement, except when it arises from a transaction which is recognised directly in equity, in which case the deferred tax is also charged or credited directly in equity.

(Incorporated in Malaysia)

### (d) Investments

Investments are stated at cost plus other direct costs and is held on a long term basis.

Where an indication of impairment losses exists, the carrying amount of the investments are assessed and written down immediately to their recoverable amount.

### (e) Income Recognition

Income on investments are recognised when the right to receive the income is established.

Income on fixed deposits are recognised on received and receivable basis.

### (f) Payables

Payables are stated at cost which is the consideration to be paid in the future for products and services received.

### (g) Study Loans

Study loans represent amount advanced to local students to finance their studies locally or abroad. The initial amount will be advanced after the study loan committee is satisfied with students eligibility to obtain the loan. Subsequent advances will be made at the beginning of every semester after evaluating the students result from previous semester. The loans are repayable after six months from the completion of the study course or students obtain their job employment.

Loans advanced will be recorded at cost and repayment by the students will be set off against the advances made.

### (h) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash consists of cash at bank and in hand including deposits.

Cash equivalents consists of investments maturing within three months from the date of acquisition and which are readily convertible to known amount of cash which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

### (i) Government Grants

Government grants are assistance extended by the Government in the form of transfers of resources to an entity in return for past or future compliance with certain conditions relating to the operating activities of the entity.

Grant given by government in relation to the purchase of land would be set-off against the land cost and carried forward in the balance sheet.
